



### Starting Point for EsF Montessori México

A mission rooted in one of the three pillars of the AMI strategic plan with a conviction to create a network in society, working in collaboration for the country through hope in childhood.



In 2019, Educators from around the world will gather in Mexico for two weeks, to revisit Montessori principles and practices in order to find innovative solutions and build sustainable initiatives for underserved communities. Eminent speakers will present their work with an aim to deepen individual and collective understanding of essential Montessori principles and practice through reflection and exchange.

The Assembly is open to anyone with an interest in:

- Applying Montessori principles beyond the classroom.
- Montessori's ideas on social change, with the aim to bring about changes in the lives of more children, sometimes living in difficult circumstances.
- Working with socially deprived children.
- Becoming involved or setting up an initiative based on the values of EsF.

The costs of the two-week programme, including accommodation, all meals, site visits and reading material are: €2000 single room / €1800 double room/€1700 triple room

“There are two realities of which mankind could take advantage for a conscious organization: humanity already united, and the new child. The new child we can have by beginning to educate at the point when men are not yet anything; when, spiritually, they are naught, when different languages and contrasting ideas are not yet formed, when they are not yet deaf to each other. At the point where there are infinite latent possibilities – both to separate and to unite the men of the future.

These must be translated to the child not as merely knowledge but by making them available in the environment in a form accessible to the very refined avid and rigidly specialized sensitivities of infancy, so that the child can absorb and ‘incarnate’ them, as he does language. In this way children will not learn them but make them an integral part of their character.”
